No Judgment, Only Love May 2020 CHRIST IS RISEN! HE IS RISEN INDEED!
This is the shout of triumph with which Christians greet the feast of the Resurrection. It is a reminder that our fears and hopes lie equally in the hands of a mighty God.

This Easter more than most, we need to hear the promise and take it to heart. This is a difficult time.

People, especially in hospitals and nursing homes, cannot be together as they would like. Children cannot gather around a parent's sickbed.

Those who live in close quarters are at special risk. Think of sailors on an aircraft carrier, or worse yet of those in prison, who are so easily forgotten by the outside world.

We do not yet know when the worst will be over. We do not know when we can visit freely, shake hands again, or gather as one for worship.

Here is what we do know: that the same God who raised Jesus from the dead is watching over us with love and mercy. And we know that this mighty, gracious God will not forget his people.

Worship

As a response to Covid-19, Our Saviour is not presently meeting face-to-face for any events that involve more than ten people. This includes conventional worship services.

In addition, it is wisest for most of our members to stay home as much as possible – to protect themselves and their neighbors. Please do this.

BUT WE CAN STILL WORSHIP! Here are some of the ways:

Sunday Services: As of the Messenger print date, our weekly worship will continue to be offered via Facebook livestreamed video each Sunday morning at 10:00am.

Video Devotions: Brian Stevenson has posted music from Voices of Praise and devotions, and Pastor Michael has been posting devotions both to Facebook and to our new YouTube channel.

OSLC Website: The "Devotional Prayers" tab leads you to reflections by Tina Korte and Pastor Michael. You can also subscribe to a daily devotion from "Christ in Our Home."

Daily Prayer: A simple booklet with services for Morning Prayer and Evening Prayer is available at church. Just drop by and ask for one. (Pastor Michael will email it to anyone who asks).

Home Activities for Families: Yvonne Rodgers has been posting regular Sunday School content to Facebook for families to do at home.

Due to the Coronavirus outbreak, food distribution was canceled for the month of March.

FCCC DAY CARE

We are excited to partner with Fauquier Community Child Care to host day care for the children of essential personnel.

We have long partnered with FCCC to host their summer Teen Camp.

This new venture is quite different. To minimize the risk of infection, the day care will use the Fellowship Hall, classrooms and kitchen, while OSLC will use the church

and office buildings – and we will not interact. When the program concludes, FCCC will also have the hall sanitized before we return for our church activities.

How to ZOOM

Overview

Until six weeks ago, the Zoom teleconferencing service was used primarily by businesspeople (and the Virginia Synod). Suddenly, it's everywhere.

But some members may be feeling left out of church events because they aren't familiar with it. Now is the time to learn!



You can join a Zoom meeting

through an email invite, an instant messaging invite, from your browser, from the Zoom desktop and mobile application, from a landline, or from a mobile phone.

For most of you, it will be as simple as clicking a link in an email from Our Saviour.

Before joining a Zoom meeting on a computer or mobile device, you can download the Zoom app by going to the following url: https://zoom.us/download. Otherwise, you will be prompted to download and install Zoom when you click a join link.

Things You Will Need to Attend a Zoom Meeting

- Preferably, an internet-connected computer (or smart phone) with a microphone and webcam.
- The Zoom app on your computer or smartphone

- OR YOU CAN JOIN BY FLIP PHONE OR LAND LINE, although you will lose many of the functions.
- Each meeting has a unique 9 or 10-digit number (e.g. 732 534 989 or 985 676 2878) called a meeting ID that will be required to join a Zoom meeting. Sometimes, a password is also required. These are usually provided in your invitation.
- If you are joining via telephone, you will need the teleconferencing phone number (e.g. 301-715-8592 or 253-215-8782) provided in the invite.

To Join By (Non-Smart) Phone

- 1. On your phone, dial the phone number provided in your invite.
- 2. Enter the meeting ID number when prompted using your dial pad.

Note: If you have already joined the meeting via computer, you will have the option to enter your 2-digit participant ID to be associated with your computer. If you have not joined on your computer, simply press # again when prompted to enter in your participant ID.
