GATHERING

The Holy Spirit calls us together as the people of God.

CONFESSION AND FORGIVENESS

The assembly stands. All may make the sign of the cross, the sign that is marked at baptism, as the presiding minister begins.

In the name of the Father, and of the + Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Amen.

The presiding minister may comment briefly upon the service of the day, and then leads the assembly in confession.

Let us confess our sin in the presence of God and of one another.

Silence is kept for reflection.

God of mercy,

we confess that we have sinned. We trust earthly powers and human authority alone. We grow fearful. We cling to false comforts.

God of might,

we confess that we have sinned. We have turned away from our neighbors. We have trusted false promises.

God in our midst,

we confess that we have sinned. We plead: come to us. Bring your mercy to birth in us.

A righteous branch springs forth: it is Christ the Lord, our Savior, in whom we have forgiveness, life, and mercy.

By the power of the Holy Spirit, receive the grace and forgiveness of God through + Christ Jesus, whose day draws near.

Amen.

The service continues with gathering song.

About the Introit and Entrance Psalm

For many centuries, only Biblical texts were used in Christian worship. Where we might sing a Gathering Hymn, earlier generations sang an Entrance Psalm (or "Introit," in Latin). In time, this was shortened to just a few verses. Even into the 1970s, Lutheran service books prescribed an Introit at the beginning of the liturgy.

During Advent, we are getting a taste of the olden days.

INTROIT OF THE DAY

Populus Sion (cf. Isaiah 30:19, 30;) Psalm 80

The Introit is sung by a solo voice.

People of Zion behold, *
The Lord is coming to save all nations;

And the Lord shall cause you hear his majestic voice* For the joy of your heart.

As the ministers enter, soloist voice sings the rest of the psalm:

² O shepherd of Israel, hear us, * you who lead Joseph like a flock:

enthroned on the cherubim, shine forth †

³ upon Ephraim, Benjamin, Manasseh. *

Rouse up your might and come to save us.

⁴ O God, bring us back; *

let your face shine on us, and we shall be saved.

- ⁵ How long, O LORD, God of hosts,* will you be angry at the prayer of your people?
- ⁶ You have fed them with tears for their bread,* an abundance of tears for their drink.
- ⁷ You have made us the taunt of our neighbors;* our foes mock us among themselves.

Glory be to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit; * as it was in the beginning is now and shall be forever. Amen.


GREETING

FIRST READING: Baruch 5:1-9

A reading from Baruch.

- ¹ Take off the garment of your sorrow and affliction, O Jerusalem, and put on forever the beauty of the glory from God.
 - ² Put on the robe of the righteousness that comes from God; put on your head the diadem of the glory of the Everlasting,
 - ³ for God will show your splendor everywhere under heaven,
 - ⁴ for God will give you evermore the name, "Righteous Peace, Godly Glory."
 - ⁵ Arise, O Jerusalem, stand upon the height; look toward the east, and see your children gathered from west and east at the word of the Holy One, rejoicing that God has remembered them.
 - ⁶ For they went out from you on foot, led away by their enemies, but God will bring them back to you, carried in glory, as on a royal throne.
 - ⁷ For God has ordered that every high mountain and the everlasting hills be made low and the valleys filled up, to make level ground,

so that Israel may walk safely in the glory of God.

- ⁸ The woods and every fragrant tree have shaded Israel at God's command.
- ⁹ For God will lead Israel with joy, in the light of his glory, with the mercy and righteousness that come from him.

This is the song of Zechariah, upon the birth of his son, who will become John the Baptist. Sung by a solo voice.

- In the tender compassion of our God, the dawn from on high shall break upon us, to shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death, and to guide our feet into the way of peace.

SECOND READING: Philippians 1:3-11


A reading from Philippians.

³ I thank my God for every remembrance of you, ⁴ always in every one of my prayers for all of you, praying with joy ⁵ for your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now. ⁶ I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work in you will continue to complete it until the day of Jesus Christ. ⁷ It is right for me to think this way about all of you, because I hold you in my heart, for all of you are my partners in God's grace, both in my imprisonment and in the defense and confirmation of the gospel. ⁸ For God is my witness, how I long for all of you with the tender affection of Christ Jesus. ⁹ And this is my prayer, that your love may overflow more and more with knowledge and full insight ¹⁰ to help you to determine what really matters, so that in the day of Christ you may be pure and blameless, ¹¹ having produced the harvest of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ for the glory and praise of God.

GOSPEL: Luke 3:1-6

The holy Gospel according to Saint Luke.

Glory to you, O Lord.

¹ In the fifteenth year of the reign of Tiberius Caesar, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, and Herod was ruler of Galilee, and his brother Philip ruler of the region of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias ruler of Abilene, ² during the high priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness. ³ He went into all the region around the Jordan, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins, ⁴ as it is written in the book of the words of the prophet Isaiah,

- "The voice of one crying out in the wilderness:
- 'Prepare the way of the Lord; make his paths straight.
- ⁵ Every valley shall be filled, and every mountain and hill shall be made low, and the crooked shall be made straight, and the rough ways made smooth, ⁶ and all flesh shall see the salvation of God.' "

Lift up your hearts.


We lift them to the Lord.

THANKSGIVING AT THE TABLE

The presiding minister addresses the assembly in the words of Zechariah 9:9:



COMMUNION

We believe that Christ is truly present in the bread and wine. All baptized Christians are invited to his table. To learn about being baptized, speak to a pastor.

You may eat the Body and drink the Blood from the cup, or you may dip the Body into the Blood before consuming them together. Alternatively, you may cross your arms in front of your chest to ask for a blessing instead of either or both elements. Those who refrain may do so trusting that Christ is fully present according to his promise.
