

The Forty Days

About Lent

What is Lent?

The time from Ash Wednesday to Easter is a season that English-speakers call Lent, although most other Christians simply call it the Forty Days. With roots in the ancient Church's way of preparing converts for Holy Baptism, this season has become an opportunity for all of us to reflect deeply on our faith.

Where Does Lent Come From?

The Biblical inspiration for this season comes from the 40 days that Jesus spent in the wilderness, fasting and resisting the temptations of the Devil. You can read about this in the fourth chapter of Luke's Gospel.

As early as the 150s AD, a Christian church order called the *Didache* encouraged members of a congregation who were able to fast in preparation for baptisms, which were often held at Easter. From the early 300s, this became a normal practice among all Christian communities.

What is "Lenten Discipline"?

The pillars of Lent are prayer, fasting, and charity (which is sometimes quaintly called "almsgiving"). These are all forms of self-discipline.

One size does not fit all! Some people cannot fast and remain healthy; others already give as much to charity as they are able. We encourage you to choose a Lenten discipline that is right for *you*. Focus on sacrificing something meaningful that will help you draw closer to God. Better yet, focus on what you can take on: What small acts can you take on to manifest the love that God calls us to share?

At the very least, take on the discipline of extra prayer. This may include joining us on Wednesdays at 7pm for a simple supper of soup and bread, followed by a service of Evening Prayer.






The presiding minister may comment briefly on the service, and the Litany is sung.

WORD

FIRST READING: DEUTERONOMY 26:1-11

A reading from Deuteronomy.

- ¹ "When you have come into the land that the Lord your God is giving you as an inheritance to possess and you possess it and settle in it, ² you shall take some of the first of all the fruit of the ground, which you harvest from the land that the Lord your God is giving you, and you shall put it in a basket and go to the place that the Lord your God will choose as a dwelling for his name.
- ³ "You shall go to the priest who is in office at that time and say to him, 'Today I declare to the Lord your God that I have come into the land that the Lord swore to our ancestors to give us.' ⁴ When the priest takes the basket from your hand and sets it down before the altar of the Lord your God, ⁵ you shall make this response before the Lord your God:
- "'A wandering Aramean was my ancestor; he went down into Egypt and lived there as an alien, few in number, and there he became a great nation, mighty and populous. ⁶ When the Egyptians treated us harshly and afflicted us, by imposing hard labor on us, ⁷ we cried to the Lord, the God of our ancestors; the Lord heard our voice and saw our affliction, our toil, and our oppression. ⁸ The Lord brought us out of Egypt with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm, with a terrifying display of power, and with signs and wonders; ⁹ and he brought us into this place and gave us this land, a land flowing with milk and honey. ¹⁰ So now I bring the first of the fruit of the ground that you, O Lord, have given me.'

"You shall set it down before the Lord your God and bow down before the Lord your God. ¹¹ Then you, together with the Levites and the aliens who reside among you, shall celebrate with all the bounty that the Lord your God has given to you and to your house."

SECOND READING: Romans 10:8b-13

A reading from Romans.

86 "The word is near you, in your mouth and in your heart"

(that is, the word of faith that we proclaim), ⁹ because if you confess with your mouth that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. ¹⁰ For one believes with the heart, leading to righteousness, and one confesses with the mouth, leading to salvation. ¹¹ The scripture says, "No one who believes in him will be put to shame." ¹² For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek; the same Lord is Lord of all and is generous to all who call on him. ¹³ For "everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved."

He ate nothing at all during those days, and when they were over he was famished. ³ The devil said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become a loaf of bread." ⁴ Jesus answered him, "It is written, 'One does not live by bread alone.'"

⁵ Then the devil led him up and showed him in an instant all the kingdoms of the world. ⁶ And the devil said to him, "To you I will give all this authority and their glory, for it has been given over to me, and I give it to anyone I please. ⁷ If you, then, will worship me, it will all be yours." ⁸ Jesus answered him, "It is written,

'Worship the Lord your God, and serve only him.'"

⁹ Then the devil led him to Jerusalem and placed him on the pinnacle of the temple and said to him, "If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down from here, ¹⁰ for it is written,



Lift up your hearts.


We lift them to the Lord.

Holy God, our living Water and our merciful Guide, together with rivers and seas, wells and springs we bless and magnify you.

You led your people Israel through the desert, and provided them water from the rock.

We praise you for Christ, our Rock and our Water, who joined us in our desert, pouring out his life for the world.

In the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread, and gave thanks; broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take and eat; this is my body, given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me.

Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying: This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me.

Remembering, therefore, his life, death, and resurrection, we await your salvation for all this thirsty world.

For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever and ever. Amen.


Invitation to Communion
